Synopsis

Like any distribution business involving a wide variety and high volume of relatively inexpensive items, the wholesale hardware field is inherently complex. On any Monday, picking tickets for some 45,000 items will flow into the Belknap warehouse. The computerized order-entry system assures that the right picking tickets will go to the right warehouse departments. The tickets direct warehouse employes to pick hardware items, accurately identified and precisely located, in one of the 43 warehouse departments.

Orders are now picked faster and errors have been cut by more than half. Operations have been simplified, from order writing through order working, picking, inventory updating and even automated recapping and bill-of-lading production. The end results are considerable savings in labor dollars and improved customer service.

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Belknap Hardware and Manufacturing serves 26 states. Publicly owned, sales reach approximately \$50 million annually. The firm stocks 70,000 items, ships another 10,000 directly to customers (drop-ship) and handles 3,000 orders for 30,000 items on an average day. The firm's first data processing equipment was installed in 1941, and since then Belknap has had computer systems, progressing finally to the present System/360s, required to process increased order volume.

The greatest gain in speed and capacity is due to what is called "multiprocessing," or the ability of the new system to handle up to six programs at the same time. In a single, order-working operation, for example, one Model 30:

- --Reads order cards keypunched from the handwritten sales orders;
- --Prints an order copy, which is an internal translation of the coded data sent in handwritten form by the sales representative. This copy is complete with item descriptions and prices, for credit department use, and to notify the sales department of price changes;
- --Reduces stored inventory data by the quantities ordered;
- --Internally sorts the items ordered into warehouse department order, and, within department into sequence by aisle number and/or bay number;
- --Prints the picking tickets mentioned, complete with order description;
- --Automatically determines the number of cartons that will be required for the customer's order, and prints the proper number of labels.
- --Stores the order data on one of ten 2311 disc storage units shared by the two computer systems.

When the release copy of a picking ticket for pre-packaged merchandise comes back to data processing, indicating an order has been filled, the other Model 30 automatically prints a multi-part extended invoice and bills-of-lading from the order data stored on the shared discs.

Each System/360 is linked to three printers. As a result, one system can maintain uninterrupted production of order copies, picking tickets, and labels for fast order processing, while the other prints invoicing and bills-of-lading. Then, as either of the computers has free time during the day, other applications are processed, such as the 1,300-employe payroll and sales analyses -- often at the same time.

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Also, the two, identical systems provide complete back-up in case of technical problems. Even on a heavy day, functions would still continue effectively with one Model 30.

As mentioned, order-filling accuracy is greatly improved. Since this system went into effect, total claims referred to the warehouse department have been reduced by 63 percent. Damage claims, unaffected by the system, are included in this figure, so the specific reduction in order clerk errors is even greater.

For example, order fillers used to spend about one-third of their time recapping prepackaged merchandise -- weighing it, figuring the correct weight class, and so forth. This is now handled completely automatically, as indicated, from weight data stored on the discs, reducing recap errors alone by 56 percent. Even shelf-goods errors (the wrong article sent to customers) have been reduced 41 percent, although cards must still be keypunched to produce appropriate bills-of-lading and recap data. The bill-of-lading procedure is initiated after the order has been picked and packed.

Another major advantage of the new system is the ready availability of detailed information at all levels of the operation, simply as a byproduct of order processing. Cycled inventory reports, for example, are produced monthly and/or semi-monthly for all of the items stocked. Frequency depends on the item and its activity. These reports, which go to Belknap's 15 buying departments, are grouped by class of item and thus to a degree, grouped by vendor. In addition, the system produces immediate exception reports on items that need quick action.

On all new items, the buying department also receives a weekly count for six weeks, until trends and the item's movement develop. In addition, a weekly report of slow-movers is generated so steps can be taken to weed them out. Slow-movers take up space, and lose money, too, in the form of insurance. Overall, Belknap is able to maintain a more viable, more saleable inventory, and pinpoint back-order situations quickly.

Yet, initially, too much stock control information was produced. This is a normal tendency because the reporting capabilities of computers are impressive. Now, not only in inventory, but in all other areas of our operation, only the information that is needed and will be used is produced. This has become a firm rule at Belknap.

Present inventory data, for example, gives buyers the information necessary to buy most effectively. Working from the various stock status reports, the buyers prepare purchase requisitions. These are keypunched and fed into the computer to print purchase orders and update the on-order inventory file. At the same time, the system prints a merchandise receipt which goes to the receiving department where it is held until the goods are received. Incoming quantities are checked against the receipt which is then sent back to data processing to indicate that the inventory involved should be transferred from on-order status to on-hand.

Also on the System/360s are a wide range of sales analyses -- monthly by product lines, by sales territories commission reporting, accounts receivable, accounts payable, and some general ledger.

SHORTED ITEM REPORT

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The development of the random access data storage file greatly increases the attractiveness of computerized order processing. Billing was Belknap's natural next step, with consideration given to inventory control, receivables, sales analyses, commissions, and the like. With order information as a base, it is even possible to build outward into, ultimately, a management information system.

Future plans include replacing the present systems with two Model 40s along with larger capacity disc drives. An on-line terminal system will be added, with keyboards permitting data entry into the system. Multiprocessing will be considerably increased as the system capacity will nearly double.



At the moment, the computers don't do anything new -- they just handle all the jobs formerly processed, but in less time and at less cost, both in terms of rental and data processing personnel. One computer shift can now accomplish what formerly required a shift and a half, and still have capacity remaining to investigate other areas of data processing.

In the meantime, there are other, more-immediate refinements to develop. One for instance, is to produce invoices and bills-of-lading even faster and more frequently each day, through the increased speed and capacity of the new computer systems. This is expected to be accomplished soon, and it will be a valuable step toward that goal of every wholesaler: optimum service to keep the customer happy.
